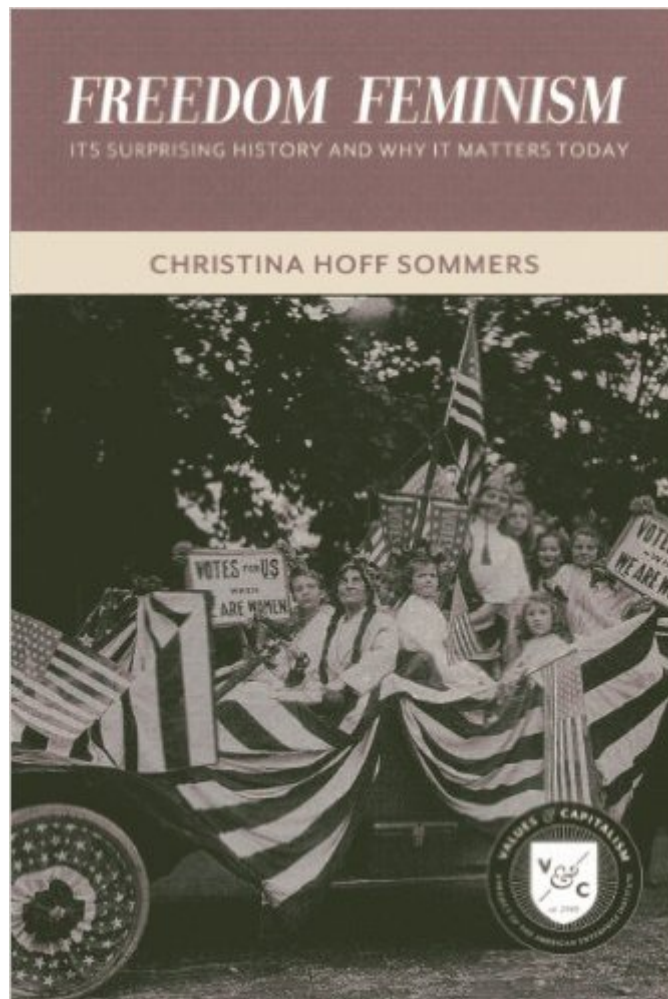

Are you a feminist? Chances are that you would say 'no'. Christina Hoff Sommers starts off her book, *Freedom Feminism*, with this valid point: most women today wouldn't call themselves feminists. Feminism has become an extreme, radical, taboo philosophy associated with angry, anti-men gender studies professors and not the historical advocates of women's rights like Susan B. Anthony and Frances Willard. In her book, Sommers takes us through the history of feminism, gives reasons why feminism is so radical today, and inspires us to redefine feminism to include women of all walks of life. She teaches something that many didn't learn growing up: there is more than one

school of feminist thought. "Egalitarian feminism" is closer to today's modern feminism, which demands equality to men in all ways. Egalitarians believed that men and women are essentially identical, and they used a more secular, progressive way of thinking than other women of their time. "Maternal feminism" acknowledges natural gender roles in its ideology and states that women are equal, but different. They sought to expand and strengthen women's traditional roles, and interestingly, were more popular and accepted by the majority of women than egalitarian feminists were. Both types promote opportunity and freedom in education, work, communities, and marriage; however, maternal feminism is ignored and even denounced by women's studies professors and modern feminists. Sommers gracefully accepts the challenge of confronting this blatant bias and provides common sense answers to some important questions about femininity and feminism. She makes it easy for anyone reading the book to understand: when women are free, many of them still value a home life compared to their risk-taking male counterparts.
